“Death in Art”

Presented by Megan Mateer, PhD

About the course: This course will be an examination of the history of the varying images of death in Western Civilization. From Greek and Roman images through the late 20th Century, society's personification of death has changed with the changing sensibilities of society. The one constant is that death remains the most popular allegory to be personified in paintings, plays, and movies. Guthke's book, The Gender of Death, will be a source for this course.

About the presenter: Megan Mateer has taught humanities for the past 7 years at Columbus State Community College, focusing on the art, literature, and history of Western Civilization from the inception of farming through the 20th Century. Her fascination for this topic began when she noticed that images of death kept showing up in every era. She discovered that death appears in a wide variety of images, crossing a diverse array of mediums.

“French Cultural Influence in North America: North to South”

Presented by Miss Josie Gonot

Wednesdays, January 7, 14, 21, 28 - 10 a.m. - 12 Noon

Center for Workforce Development (WD) 4th Floor

About the course: Miss Gonot's new course in her French Lecture and Music Series explores the modern cultural remnants of early French history in North America. Nearly 13 million U. S. residents are of French descent, with an estimated 1.5 million still speaking French in the home. Our 4-week tour essentially starts at the top of the Mississippi, where Cartier claimed Canada in 1534. Eventually LaSalle dumps us into the Gulf of Mexico near his beloved Louisiana, established in honor of the Sun King. All sessions will include lecture, film and video footage, live and recorded music, and more.

About the presenter: Josie Gonot has been a popular presenter for LLI since our beginning. French historian, language instructor, public speaker, professional vocalist, and developer of the two series: "French Lecture and Music" and "A Taste of France," she holds a degree in French from Capital University, has completed graduate work at OSU and Ashland University, and teaches French to homeschoolers and individuals in her home studio in Gahanna.

"Abraham Lincoln - A Bicentennial/Retrospective Examination" **Presented by Kathleen Riley, PhD**

Thursdays, January 8, 15, 22, 29 - 10 a.m. - 12 Noon

About the course: In light of the 2009 Lincoln Bicentennial - "all Lincoln all the time" - this course will explore Lincoln as a President during our nation's greatest crisis (The Civil War), and Lincoln's speeches and rhetoric. A recent book by Douglas L. Wilson, LINCOLN'S SWORD: The Presidency and the Power of Words (Vintage Books, 2006) argues that Lincoln's greatest claim to fame is to be found in his "rare combination of leadership and literary ability". Recommended for reading during the course is either Wilson's book, or a collection of essays by James McPherson: Abraham Lincoln and the Second American Revolution (Oxford U. Press, 1990).

About the presenter: Kathleen L. Riley is Professor of History at Ohio Dominican University. This is her third course for LLI. Her PhD is from Notre Dame University. Dr. Riley teaches a variety of history and humanities courses at ODU, including a course on American Religious History, and is the higher education consultant on the Teaching American History Grant, a Department of Education-funded project: Hands on History.

Note: *Participants are urged to read any one of the many available biographies of Lincoln as prior preparation for this course.*

"A Personal Journey/Discussion with WWII Combatants" **Presented by Norm Lambert**

About the course: This course will be a once in a lifetime presentation of interviews with at least 400 WWII participants, which will include German, Japanese, British, and United States points of view and actual comments. Materials utilized will include maps, pictures, framed art, books, and authentic written comments by actual participants, drawn from face to face discussions conducted over the past fifty years. Questions will be:

January 9: How and Why the Journey Began; Britain Enters the War.

January 16: German Participants and British Connections.

January 23: American/Japanese Combatants and Japanese Pilots.

January 30: Locating downed aircraft; German POWs, Hap Arnold's Life.

About the presenter: Norm Lambert is a collector, researcher, and speaker who currently teaches as an adjunct professor at Columbus State Community College. Norm has collected unique WWII memorabilia and live interviews around the world for more than fifty years. He presented an LLI Coffee & Conversation, "Aviation Archaeology", in May, 2008.

“An Insider’s View of the OSU Marching Band”

About the Conversation: The history of the OSU Marching Band will be traced starting with its military heritage, then progressing through directors from Gustav Bruder to Jon Woods. Major developments, many of which were of national importance, will be supplemented with stories about band performances, drum majors, and band members. Video tapes of band performances will be shown.

About the Presenter: Paul Droste's first exposure to the Marching Band came from his high school band director, who was an OSU graduate and member of the band. Paul was “programmed” to attend Ohio State from an early age. After marching in the band for four years (1954-57) he taught public school band and orchestra, returning to OSU to be Graduate Assistant Director in 1961 and Assistant Director in 1961 and Assistant Director in 1966. Paul served as director from 1970 through 1983, the first former member to become director. His daughter, son, and son-in-law also marched in the band. In retirement, Paul continues to do research on the history of the band.

About the Conversation: Learn about simple and effective ways to reduce your episodes of colds and flu; the differences between bacterial and viral illnesses; when to see a medical doctor vs. nurse practitioner; natural antibiotics we all have in our kitchen; proper hand washing; effective sanitizers and disinfectants; what CDC and WHO have to say about flu; how to protect from illness on long plane trips; what vaccines we all need to keep current; how lifestyle can help keep us healthy; myths, old wives' tales, and the stuff grandma told us.

Also: Hands on experience growing and looking at some of the bacteria in our environment and on our bodies. (An actual lab!)

About the presenter: Dr. Karl spent part of her career as an epidemiologist in Columbus and is presently a professor of microbiology at Columbus State community college and at Capital University, Department of Nursing.

About the Conversation: The Elderhostel program provides “away from home” travel and learning experiences for seniors. About the Conversation: Hear the story of a particular friendship between Abraham and Mary Todd Lincoln and the ancestors of the presenter. Glimpse the lives of the Lincolns from a new vantage point. View letters written by the Lincolns. Retrace the Lincoln’s friendship with the Dixon-Welling family at a great moment in American history.

About the Presenter: Caroline VanDeusen’s great-great grandmother, Elizabeth Dixon, wife of Senator James Dixon of Connecticut, and a close friend, sat with Mary Todd Lincoln in the room where Lincoln lay dying. Caroline has inherited artifacts and documents related to this event and to the friendship between the two couples. She serves as Ohio’s state liaison to the Lincoln Bicentennial Commission honoring the legacy of America’s greatest president---Abraham Lincoln. As liaison, Caroline blends a diverse business background with her personal passion---historical research. 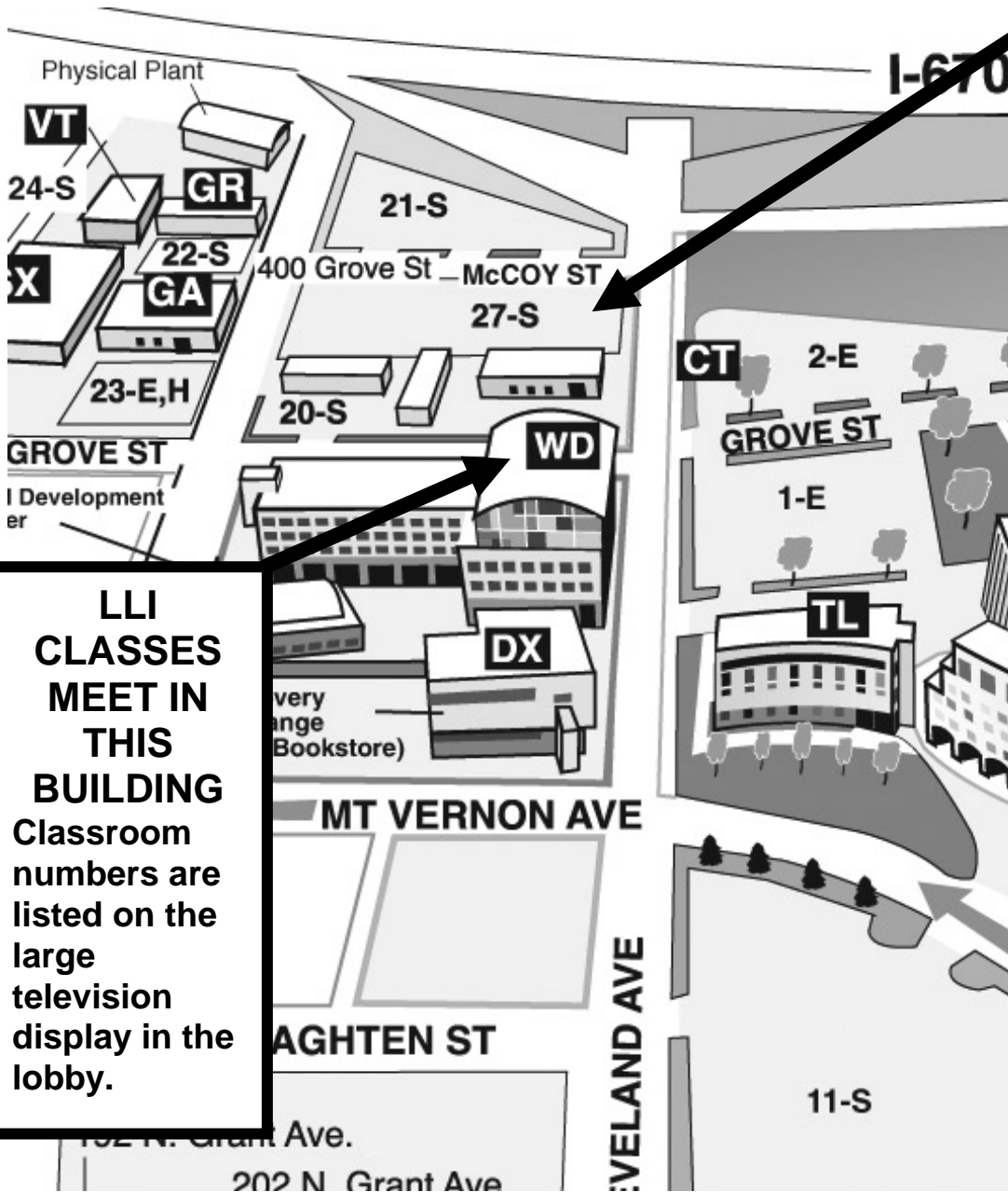
