Top 3 reasons to register early for **Spring Semester 2020!**

- **Better Course Selection.**
- Plan your schedule three months in advance.
- No course registration = Risk losing your immigration status!

All F-1 students are expected to be registered in classes full-time for a minimum of 12 credit hours per semester. Additionally 9 of your total credits must be considered to be on-campus courses, not online courses.



Traveling outside the U.S. during the Winter?

Don't wait until the last minute, have your I-20 signed now!

If you are planning to travel outside the United States during winter break, please visit ISS office during walk-in advising hours. No appointment needed. You should have your I-20 signed before traveling if your travel signature is before, or close to, the one-year mark on the previous signature.

During the visit, remember to bring your passport, most recent I-94, and current I-20. Our office will review your immigration documents and sign your I-20 for travel.

DON'T FORGET...

- •Keep all of your travel documents up-to-date and valid.
- •Have your I-20 signed at least one week before you leave the U.S.
- •Report any changes of address or personal information to ISS within 10 days.
- •Notify ISS if you plan to interrupt or discontinue your studies.

Ask an International Student Advisor

Last month we launched our "International Student Success Series: Are you Transfer, Career, or Workforce Ready?." The events were well received and we had a good turnout. If you missed the event, don't worry. We will host it again next semester. Here are some quick questions and answers (Q&A) that might help you prepare for your CPT or OPT application.

What is CPT?

CPT is designed to provide eligible students with an opportunity to gain actual employment experience that is "an integral part of an established curriculum." It allows you to participate in an internship, practicum or cooperative education program, if it is a requirement of your degree. CPT is employer specific and must be done before you graduate. It is not meant to facilitate the creation of special employment opportunities for individual F-1 students.

Eligibility Criteria and Requirements

- You must have been nine months in lawful F-1 status.
- The CPT opportunity must be either: designed to enhance program and endorsed by academic department or it must be necessary to complete graduation requirements; or it must be a co-op,
- It must be an internship, or work study program.

Additional Notes

- You must have a job or internship offer. (Don't start the job before getting CPT approval; CPT authorization is specific to the training position)
- CPT is authorized for a limited and set period of time and for a specific job at a specific employer.
- CPT can be authorized for either full-time or part-time employment.
- Full-time employment with CPT for a period longer than 12 months will affect OPT eligibility.
- If endorsed by academic department, work must be authorized by an international student advisor, not USCIS.

How to Apply: Bring to an international student advisor:

- Completed Form "Curricular Practical Training Recommendation" (Page 2). A note from faculty or staff is not sufficient.
- Print a copy of course registration (Registration requirement)
- An employment offer letter from the prospective employer describing the employment
- Letter from the cooperative education office stating the parameters of the approved co-op position (optional).

What is OPT?

Optional Practical Training (OPT- Post completion/ after graduation) is an employment benefit for students who have maintained their F1 status.

Eligibility Criteria and Requirements

- Has been enrolled full-time for one full academic year.
 - Academic year = consecutive fall and spring semester enrollment.
- Is maintaining valid F-1 status, and Is physically present in the U.S.
- Intends to pursue a practical training or employment opportunity directly related to their major field of study.
- Has not been authorized for 365+ days of full-time Curricular Practical Training (CPT) at the same degree level.
- Has not been authorized for 12 months of OPT at the same or higher degree level.

Additional Notes

- More flexible and often easier to obtain than curricular practical training.
- You do not need to have a job offer before you apply for OPT. However, be aware that during your 12-month period, you are only allowed a cumulative total of 90 days of unemployment. You MUST also report your employment to ISS.
- You must be physically present in the U.S. at the time you submit your application to U.S. Citizenship & Immigration Services (USCIS).

POST-COMPLETION OPTIONAL PRACTICAL TRAINING (OPT)



Preconditions	You must have been lawfully enrolled full-time for one full academic year (9 months) before being eligible for Post-Completion OPT.
Location	You may engage in OPT for any employer for the duration of OPT authorization; as long as the employment qualifies under OPT standards.
Duration	Cumulative maximum of 12 months per educational level. Part-time OPT is deducted from the 12 month limit at 50%. 12 months must be used within 14 months of completion of course of study. Authorization to engage in practical training employment is automatically terminated when you transfer to another school or begin your study at another educational level.
Hours per week	For standard post-completion OPT, a student must be adequately employed to avoid limits on unemployment. Student may not be unemployed for an aggregate of more than 90 days (<u>8 CFR</u> 214.2(f)(10)(ii)(E)
Field/level of work	Employment must be directly related to your course of study.
Offer of employment	No offer of employment is required to apply for standard OPT, but you will be expected to work during the OPT EAD validity period. Students on post-completion OPT are limited to a maximum of 90 days of unemployment.
Effect on other work	Prior use of full-time Curricular practical Training for one year or more eliminates eligibility for OPT.
Approval process	Must apply for and receive an Employment Authorization Document (EAD) from USCIS with assistance of DSO before work begins. Apply to P/DSO for OPT recommendation sufficiently in advance to allow the P/DSO to update your SEVIS record with the recommendation prior to your program completion date.
Miscellaneous	File I-765 application for EAD with USCIS Lockbox Facility (see next page for instructions.) The application for post-completion OPT with the Form I-765 must be received by USCIS within 30 days of the date the OPT recommendation is made in SEVIS. You cannot accrue more than 90 days of unemployment while on post-completion OPT. If you are close to 90 days, consult with your P/DSO (international student advisor) in Madison Hall, Lower Level.
	Continue to update your P/DSO (international student advisor) with address changes and changes in employment while on post-completion OPT.

COLUMBUS STATE'S SHORT TERM EXCHANGE PROGRAM

Do you know Columbus State has a short term exchange program with our partner institution in Germany?



Yes, our college and Berufliches Schulzentrum für Elektrotechnik Dresden (BSZET, a vocational academy focused on engineering and IT) in Dresden, Germany, have developed a short term work-based exchange program for students. This program allows underserved students from both colleges to gain insight into career and workforce development practices in their chosen STEM career fields and provides a work-based learning opportunity

that increases global skills and international understanding.

This program is an every-other-year exchange of students and faculty for ten days. Last year, ten students and two faculty from BSZET visited CSCC. In addition to the cultural experience, they also took part in some specialized labs with the Engineering, IT, and Design faculty. They also visited with business partners in Ohio.

This September, ten CSCC students from the Business, Engineering, Computer Science, and the OSU Pathway programs celebrated meeting with our partner institution, BSZET, and are serving as ambassadors in Dresden, Germany, a sister city of Columbus. Both German and American students worked in pairs to study throughout their time on projects, which included comparing and contrasting the education systems of the two countries, the culture, and mobility with regard to the Smart Cities Initiative. Besides participating in classes, meeting the

city and state of Saxony officials, students also visited the manufacturing plant for Theegarten-Pactec. Here students learn how machines can do the packing of thousands of candies in one minute and pass all quality checks. If you ever enjoyed a Hershey's Kiss chocolate candy, you can know it was wrapped by a Theegarten-Pactec machine. The topics of engineering, logistics, business, marketing, and trade realities were discussed.

Maintaining Your F-1 student status:

Full-time Enrollment

Please be aware that your <u>academic advisor</u> and representatives of other college offices may not know about the F-1 full-time requirement. Be sure to make them aware of the requirement when discussing course registration options.

F-1 Student Employment

If you are interested in finding more information regarding regulations related to employment while studying in the United States, go to <u>ICE.gov</u>.

Please note: Do not work without authorization. Unauthorized employment is a violation of your F1 status leading to termination of your SEVIS record. If your I-20 is terminated for "Unauthorized Employment," you must depart the country immediately. For an on-campus job search, go to www.cscc.edu, click on "ABOUT", then scroll down to the Employment field.

If you have any questions regarding employment opportunities or work authorizations, please schedule an appointment to see me (JoYin Tang) by calling 614-287-2074.

Graduating F1 Students

If you are a graduating student, file a "petition to graduate" form by the "petition to graduate" deadline date. Submit a photocopy of the petition to the International Student Services office, Madison Hall, Lower Level and schedule an appointment to meet with the P/DSO (Principal/Designated School Official) to discuss F1 student options upon graduation. Your options upon completion of your studies at CSCC are:

- Depart the U.S. within 60 days of completing the course of study or apply for OPT.
- Continue in F-1 status by pursuing further F-1 studies at another school.
- Apply for standard post-completion optional practical training 90 days before graduation date or program end date and no later than 60 days after completing your course of study.
- Apply to change status to another non-immigration classification no late than 60 days after completing the course of study.

Travel outside the U.S

If you are planning to travel outside the United States during semester break, you must have page 2 of your SEVIS I-20 Form signed by one of the College's DSOs. The signatures are good for one year (except during OPT). Bring with you to the appointment your passport, I-94, and current I-20. Our office will review your immigration documents and endorse your I-20 for travel.

Upon return to the U.S., please report to ISS and bring with you photocopies of the following documents:

- New visa stamp if you recently applied for or renewed your F1 visa
- If you recently renewed your passport, copy of the first 3 pages of the new passport including the expiration date page
- Form I-94: to access your electronic I-94 admission document, go to www.cbp.gov/i94
